FY20 Highlights

- USDA funding allowed the ECIA Training Institute to provide 36 group trainings to 201 individuals
- Thanks to a \$1,650,000 HUD grant ECIA secured and is administering for Clinton and Maquoketa, lead hazards have been removed from 42 homes, helping 46 children under the age of six
- ECIA was awarded a \$3,000,000 HUD grant to address lead hazards in 120 units throughout Dubuque County
- Four communities will be using \$400,000 in Community Catalyst Building Remediation funds ECIA secured for downtown redevelopment
- A new Mainstream Voucher program will allow ECIA's housing division to assist 39 more individuals who are non-elderly & disabled

Pivoting during the pandemic

- ECIA, United Way, Community Foundation of Greater Dubuque, and the Dubuque Area Labor Harvest collaborated to provide 437 food boxes benefitting 732 adults and 374 children
- E.C.I.A Business Growth, Inc., Dubuque Initiatives, Dubuque and Jackson Counties administered an emergency loan fund to assist small businesses, helping 72 businesses lending out \$710,000, at a 1% interest rate, 36 month term, no payments, no interest for the first six months.
- RTA and Northeast Iowa Area Agency on Aging delivered 6,500 frozen meals to over 400 seniors in Delaware, Dubuque and Jackson Counties
- ECIA's housing division used \$818,468 in CARES Act funds to maintain normal operations and purchase PPE for their vulnerable populations and staff
- ECIA assisted six communities in getting \$463,638 in CDBG CARES funding for public service projects
